

Methodology

- Survey among 800 registered voters nationwide ages 55+ (400 via telephone and 400 via panel) conducted December 9-16, 2024. Respondents were selected randomly from purchased sample and opt-in panel participants, respectively. Sampling controls were used to ensure that a proportional and representative number of respondents were interviewed from such demographic groups as gender, race, and geographic region.
 - Gender breakdown: 46% men 54% women
 - Party ID breakdown: 39% Republican, 25% Independent, 33% Democrat
- ±3.5% overall margin of error at the 95% confidence interval for overall survey.












Do you agree or disagree with the government providing billions of dollars in subsidies each year to insurance companies because of the Inflation Reduction Act?






What should the government do with any money it saves from lower prices on drugs for Medicare recipients?






